Dr. Jill M. Raisor '03

Dr. Jill M. Raisor '03, Professor of Teacher Education, is the 2023 recipient of the USI Distinguished Professor Award. She is being recognized for her exceptional service to students, teaching and scholarship, as well as her vast work in the community.

Raisor joined USI faculty full-time in 2010 as Teacher in Residence, and over the course of her tenure has served as a Children's Learning Center (CLC) Liaison and Coordinator, Chair of Teacher Education and now as Professor of Teacher Education.

Throughout her tenure, Raisor has taught a diverse array of courses at the University, including but not limited to, Music, Movement, Play, and the Expressive Arts for the Young Child; Growth and Development Early Childhood; and Guidance of Young Children. Students consistently praise her for creating an environment where they feel heard, valued and engaged. Raisor is also recognized as a dedicated mentor, guiding new faculty through the publication process of their first manuscripts during their pre-tenure years.

During her role as a liaison for the former CLC on campus, Raisor played a pivotal role in the Center's success, contributing to its national accreditation and achieving a prestigious four-star rating from the National Association for the Education of Young Children. She fostered strong relationships between the Center, University community and various external entities.

In her current role as Professor of Teacher Education, Raisor unites individuals with a shared purpose to promote thriving communities, including USI faculty and students, regional children, and business and organizational leaders. She serves on several administrative boards for local agencies, including the Indiana Early Intervention Conference Planning Committee, the Early Care and Education Coalition of Vanderburgh County Advisory Committee, Safe Kids of Vanderburgh and Warrick Counties, Building Blocks and the Ivy Tech Community College Evansville Advisory Board.

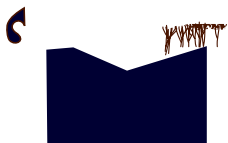
Raisor consistently integrates the classroom with the community, collaborating on curriculum development with local entities for distribution to regional schools. For example, she worked with USI students to create curriculum for BFit by Bob's Gym childcare areas, earning praise from program staff and parents. She also co-designed curriculum for the Evansville Mounted Patrol.

With more than 20 peer-reviewed publications, 85 professional presentations (over 25 with students) and five funded grants, Raisor's contributions to education and community outreach are substantial.

Raisor was the recipient of the 2021 USI Alumni Award, the 2018 Outstanding Academic Advisor Award and the 2013 Excellence in Service Award for the Pott College of Science, Engineering, and Education.

She earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education in 2003 from USI, a master's degree in education from Indiana University and a doctorate of curriculum and instruction from Southern Illinois University Carbondale.

The Distinguished Professor Award was established in 1983 and is USI's highest award given in recognition of significant achievement in teaching, scholarship and service. As a recipient, Raisor will receive a \$7,000 stipend plus a \$3,000 faculty development grant underwritten by generous donors to the USI Foundation.

Dr. Mark D. Krahlung

Dr. Mark D. Krahlung, Associate Professor of Chemistry, is the recipient of the 2023 H. Lee Cooper Core Curriculum Teaching Award. He is being recognized for his nearly 30 years of service as a professor, scholar and leader in the Core Curriculum at USI.

Krahlung joined the University in 1994 and has served as Director of University Core Curriculum (UCC) and Associate Dean for the Pott College of Science, Engineering, and Education, in addition to his current role as Associate Professor.

As Director of the UCC for nearly nine years, he oversaw the UCC, chaired the UCC Council, coordinated the review of new courses proposed for addition to the UCC and assisted with the assessment of curriculum. Krahlung was also instrumental in the development and inception of USI's UNIV 101 First Year Experience course, required for all USI freshmen.

His commitment to a general education core extended beyond the University—Krahlung served on the Indiana Statewide Core Transfer Leadership Team at the state level to implement Senate Enrolled Act 182, a statute requiring all state public colleges and universities to identify a 30-credit core curriculum that would transfer between all institutions. He has also been involved in an array of community activities linked to general education, such as the One Book One Community Planning and the Bonding through Books Committees.

In his role as Associate Dean for the Pott College of Science, Engineering, and Education from 2014-18, Krahlung was responsible for various internal operations related to the administration of the College, including monitoring College course enrollment, coordination of external grants and special projects, oversight of the College Advising and Resource Center, among other responsibilities.

Currently, in his role as Associate Professor of Chemistry, Krahlung imparts his extensive knowledge in various chemistry courses, receiving acclaim for his adeptness in simplifying complex content for chemistry and non-chemistry majors alike.

Beyond the classroom, he has served on several University search committees in addition to other University committees including the USI Eagle Experience, the First Year Experience and the USI Nature Preserve Committees. He presently serves on the USI Merit Scholars Selection Committee.

Krahlung earned a bachelor's degree in chemistry and physical science education in 1983 from Southwest Minnesota State University and a doctorate in chemistry in 1992 from the University of Wisconsin.

The H. Lee Cooper Core Curriculum Teaching Award was established in 2000 and honors USI faculty members whose work in University Core Courses has been especially creative and successful in furthering UCC goals. As a recipient, Krahlung will receive a \$4,000 stipend and a \$2,000 faculty development grant underwritten by longtime and generous University friends, Ann and H. Lee Cooper III.

Fall 2023 honorary degree recipients are celebrated in the University of Southern Indiana community for their continued dedication to higher education. The recipients are credited for actively shaping their respective communities and have made significant contributions to science and business at USI and beyond.

Marjorie O. Labhart will receive an honorary Doctor of Science degree at the College of Nursing and Health Professions and Pott College of Science, Engineering, and Education and School of Graduate Studies Ceremony, and Timothy B. Mahoney will receive an honorary Doctor of Business degree at the College of Liberal Arts and Romain College of Business and School of Graduate Studies Ceremony.

Marjorie O. Labhart, Instructor Emerita in Mathematics, is receiving an honorary Doctor of Science degree for her dedication and expertise in the field of mathematics and her generous service and support to the University of Southern Indiana.

Labhart began her teaching career as a full-time faculty member the first day the University opened on September 15, 1965. She taught in the USI Mathematics Department until her retirement in 2008. Over this 43-year period, she saw the campus move from the Centennial School to its permanent location in 1969 with one building to the flourishing campus we know today.

Labhart, with her extensive expertise in the field, was renowned for her meticulous approach and dedication in teaching a diverse range of mathematics courses. Despite the intricacies of the subject, she earned recognition from her students for her exceptional ability to make complex content understandable at all levels. Labhart's knowledge and guidance were frequently called upon during the creation of foundational courses within USI's current Mathematical Sciences Department. She also played a pivotal role as a mentor to new faculty members and actively

contributed to several committees, consistently advocating for the significance of a robust mathematical education on campus.

Her support extended beyond the classroom, as she was instrumental in forming USI's first Student Government Association and was a member of the first Faculty Council (presently Faculty Senate). Labhart received the Faculty Recognition Award in 2005 for her work in and beyond the classroom.

Labhart and her family have invested in the University and its students for many years, including in 1996,

establishing the Labhart-Olsen Family Math Scholarships for USI undergraduate students majoring in an academic program offered by the Mathematical Sciences Department. These scholarships bring top mathematics students to USI, strengthening the department; the Pott College of Science, Engineering, and Education; the University; and community as a whole.

Labhart earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Evansville and a master's degree from the University of Tennessee.

President Ronald S. Rochon became the fourth president of the University of Southern Indiana in 2018. USI's presidential seal is embossed with the motto education by the people, education for the people. One of Rochon's core messages following his appointment was, "This campus is a community institution. It is, and always will be, the peoples' campus."

From its initial stages of planning in the early 1960s, community leaders have supported the University by providing a solid base for its present success and future growth. For more than 58 years, the University has continued to uphold its mission under the strong leadership of its first three presidents, David L. Rice, H. Ray Hoops, Linda L. M. Bennett, and now, Rochon.

The University of Southern Indiana was established on September 15, 1965, in the old Centennial School Building, offering classes to 412 students. In 1967 Southern Indiana Higher Education, Inc. (SIHE) raised nearly \$1 million to acquire the land where the campus now sits. The University moved to its present site four miles west of the city limits of Evansville in September 1969. The University graduated its first class of baccalaureate degree students in 1971 and achieved initial North Central Association accreditation in 1974.

USI Today

USI enrolls nearly 9,300 dual credit, undergraduate and graduate students in more than 130 areas of study. A public higher education institution located on a beautiful 1,400-acre campus, USI offers programs through the Romain College of Business, College of Liberal Arts, College of Nursing and Health Professions, the Pott College of Science, Engineering, and Education and the School of Graduate Studies.

The College of Nursing and Health Professions also offers classes at the Stone Family Center for Health Sciences in downtown Evansville. The University offers study-abroad opportunities in many countries and is host to international students from around the globe.

USI is a two-time Carnegie Foundation Community Engaged University and offers programs and services to more than 15,000 participants annually through Outreach and Engagement. Programs and services include the Center for Applied Research, College Achievement Program, Community Engagement, Historic New Harmony, Historic Southern Indiana, New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art, Corporate Partnerships and Customized Training, Lifelong Learning Noncredit Programs, ROTC, Safety Training, Service Learning, Southern Indiana Japanese School, and the Veteran, Military and Family Resource Center.

A competitive member of NCAA Division I and the Ohio Valley Conference, USI offers 19 varsity intercollegiate men's and women's sports.

Under the leadership of President Rochon, the University continues a tradition of affordable excellence through innovation and engagement, and positions itself as a top choice for high-caliber college students across the state, nationally and internationally.

Presidential Medallion

During the Middle Ages, medallions signified membership in religious orders and guilds; in the Renaissance, membership in elite orders of knighthood and prominence in government of the day. Today, colleges and universities strike medallions to commemorate important events and achievements. The University of Southern Indiana Presidential Medallion signifies the authority bestowed upon the president.

Donated by the late Melvin Denner, Professor Emeritus of Biology, and Anne Denner, former Instructor in Nutrition and Biology, and their family, a medallion was fabricated by Medalcraft for the 1995 inauguration of H. Ray Hoops, USI President. Dr. Denner served as grand marshal at the University's first inauguration.

For President Rochon's inauguration, a new medallion was struck with the updated Seal and a new chain was fabricated. In addition to the names of USI's presidents on the reverse side of the medallion, the new chain was commissioned bearing their names on four separate plates. Made by Medalcraft Mint, Inc., the medallion and chain were underwritten by a generous gift from University trustee and alumnus, Ronald D. Romain '73 and alumna Connie Dart Romain '74.

Gonfalons

Ceremonial flags called gonfalons originated in the Middle Ages for civil and military processions, often appearing beneath the steel head of a knight's lance. In Italy, gonfalons designated individual Italian republics; the chief magistrate or other high official served as gonfalonier, carrying the banner.

At the University of Southern Indiana, gonfalons represent each major academic unit; faculty members, department heads and deans serve as gonfaloniers. First used in 2005 and presented to the University as a gift from the Campus Store, new gonfalons were needed and fabricated for the 2019 Inauguration Ceremony.

University Seal

The University Seal, originally designed by Nussmeier Engraving and updated in 2018, bears the University's colors—blue, red and white—with gray. The shield signifies the importance of higher education in defending citizens against ignorance.

Between the two banners displaying the University's name appears an open book, illuminated by the torch of knowledge. Trees on either side of the name suggest not only the University's pastoral Southern Indiana setting but also life, growth and continuity.

The open book emphasizes the University's commitment to learning and discovery.
