

Private for-profit institution: A private institution in which the individual(s) or agencyin control receivescompensation other than wages, rent, or other expenses for the assumption of risk.

Private nonprofit institution: A private institution in which the individual(s) or agencyin control receives no compensation other than wages, rent, or other expenses for the assumption of risk. These include both independent on profit schools and those affiliated with a religious organization.

Proprietary institution: See Private for-profit institution.

Public institution: An educationalinstitution whose programs and activities are operated by publicly electedor appointed schoo officials, and which is supported primarily by public funds.

Quarter calendar system: A calendar system which the academic year consists of three sessions called quarters of about 12 weeks each. The range may be from 10 to 15 weeks. There may be an additional quarter in the summer.

Race/ethnicity: Categoryusedto describegroupsto which individuals belong, identify with, or belongin the eyesof the community. The categories do not denote scientific definitions of anthropological origins. A person may be counted in only one group.

Race/ethnicity unknown: Categoryusedto classify studentsor employees/whoserace/ethnicity is not known and whom institutions are unable to place in one of the specified racial/ethnic categories.

RecognizedPostsecondaryCredential: Includes both Title IV eligible degrees certificates, and other recognizedpostsecondal credentials Any credentialthat is receivedafter completion of a programthat is eligible for Title IV federalstudentaid. Credentials that are awarded to recognize an individual's attainment of measurable echnicalor industry/occupation skills necessary to obtain employment advance within an industry occupation (Generally based on standards leveloped or endorsed by employers or industry associations).

Religious affiliation/commitment (as admission factor): Special consideration given in the admission processor affiliation with a certain church or faith/religion, commitment to a religious vocation, or observance of certain religious tenets/lifestyle.

*Religious counseling: One-on-oneor group counseling with trained professionals for students who want to explore religious problems or issues.

*Remedial services: Instructional coursesdesignedfor studentsdeficient in the general competencies necessary for a regular postsecondary curriculum and educational setting.

Required fees: Fixed sum charged to students for items not covered by tuition and required of such a large proportion of all students that the student who does NOT pay is the exception. Do not include application fees or optional fees such as lab fees or parking fees.
