


The 2016 College of Liberal Arts Commencement speaker is Becky J. Boling '75. A graduate of USI, Boling completed her Bachelor of Arts in Spanish Studies in 1975. She currently is a professor of Spanish and Latin American literature at Carleton College in Northfield, Minnesota.

After graduating from USI, she went on to Indiana State University where she earned a Master of Arts and Sciences in Foreign Languages (Spanish). She then attended Northwestern University where she received a Ph.D. in Hispanic Studies (Spanish). While working on her doctorate, she was an instructor at both Northwestern University and Illinois Institute of Technology. She also taught English for three years at St. Augustine Community College, mostly to Spanish-speaking residents. After leaving the Chicago area, she accepted a teaching position at Carleton College in 1983.

In 2009, Boling was designated as an endowed chair, and became the Stephen R. Lewis, Jr. Professor of Spanish and the Liberal Arts

LISA R. GISH TO DELIVER COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS

Lisa R. Gish '00 M'04 is the 2016 Commencement speaker for the College of Nursing and Health Professions. She is the director of Clinic Operations with Tri-State Community Clinics, LLC and president of Integrity Healthcare Solutions, LLC. She earned a degree in nursing from Deaconess Hospital School of Nursing before graduating from the University of Southern Indiana in 2000 with a Bachelor of Science in Nursing, and in 2004 with a Master of Health Administration.

In her current role, Gish oversees the day-to-day operations of 13 clinic locations and coordinates new implementations. She helps direct wellness activities for clients and coordinates to ensure population health improvement year-over-year.

Prior to joining Tri-State Community Clinics in 2010, Gish was the

USI BESTOWS TWO HONORARY DEGREES FOR

Today's honorary degree recipients are celebrated in the University of Southern Indiana community for their commitment to their respective fields. One has influenced the musical and theatrical community locally and around the world and the other has dedicated his career to academic excellence in the area of history and communal studies in southern Indiana.

Philip H. Hagemann will receive an honorary Doctor of Humanities degree and Dr. Donald E. Pitzer will receive an honorary Doctor of Laws degree. The honorary degrees will be bestowed during the Graduate Ceremony.

Philip H. Hagemann is a 2016 Honorary Degree recipient for the University of Southern Indiana. Hagemann will receive an Honorary Doctor of Humanities during the Graduate Ceremony on Friday, April 29, 2016.

He was born and raised in Mount Vernon, Indiana, the son of Harry and Lorene (Knight) Hagemann. Music has been a central part of his life since beginning piano lessons at the age of 7.

After graduating from Mount Vernon High School, he earned a bachelor's degree from Northwestern University, following which he spent two years playing saxophone in U.S. Army bands in Austria and Germany. He then earned a master's at Columbia University's Teachers College. For 22 years he taught music in secondary schools in Bergen County, New Jersey, and Rockland County, New York, a suburban area northwest of New York City. While teaching in Rockland he became the conductor of the Rockland County Choral Society, a position he still holds today, and where he has conducted many choral masterpieces, including Beethoven's Ninth Symphony and Requiems of Mozart and Brahms, to mention a few.

While teaching, Hagemann discovered a facility for composing, which has led to the publication of 75 choral pieces, the most famous of which is a Christmas novelty, written with Penny Leka, titled "Fruitcake." It has become a holiday standard sung by thousands of choruses. He also has composed 10 one-act chamber operas and two full-length operas, based on literary works of G. B. Shaw, Oscar Wilde, Edith Wharton and the Bible. Two of the short operas, Paris and Oenone, and The Nightingale and the Rose, won national competitions of the National Opera Association.

Hagemann is a vice president of Opera Index, a New York organization of opera lovers, which sponsors a competition for young singers, awarding over \$50,000 in prizes each year.

Since 1983, he has sponsored a competition for high school music students in Posey County, Indiana, the finals of which are presented as a free public concert each summer in Thrall's Opera House in New Harmony, Indiana, under the auspices of USI's Historic New Harmony.

Hagemann's love of theatre led him to become an investor in and/or producer of more than 100 plays and musicals on Broadway, in London and Australia, and on U.S. and United Kingdom tours. As co-producer he has won three Tony Awards and one Olivier Award. He is involved with five shows currently running on Broadway: Eugene O'Neill's Hughie, Gloria Estefan's On Your Feet, An American in Paris, The Book of Mormon and The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time.

Currently, Hagemann lives in Manhattan but makes frequent visits to Indiana, where he maintains an apartment in Evansville.

DISTINGUISHED AND EXTRAORDINARY SERVICE

Dr. Donald E. Pitzer is receiving an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree at the 2016 Graduate Commencement ceremony for the University of Southern Indiana.

Pitzer is professor emeritus of history and director emeritus of the Center for Communal Studies at USI. He graduated from Wittenberg University in his hometown of Springfield, Ohio, with a bachelor's degree in humanities in 1958. He earned his master's and doctoral degrees in history in 1962 and 1966 at The Ohio State University. In 1983, he was a scholar-in-residence at Harvard. At USI, he received the Distinguished Professor Award in 1984 and inducted into the President's Circle in 2014. He led USI Commencement processions as Grand Marshal for nearly 15 years. He received the Hoosier Historian Award from the Indiana Historical Society in 2011.

In 1967, Pitzer joined the University's faculty when the University was only two years old and holding classes at Centennial Elementary School, and participated in the groundbreaking of the present campus in 1968. He was the first chair of the History Department from 1976 to 1998. In 2007, he established the Donald E. Pitzer History Scholarship to assist promising students.

Pitzer served on the USI/New Harmony

Foundation Board of Directors and is a

the chair of this organization for two years. She was invited to nationally share numerous innovative ideas related to the teaching and learning of mathematics; she spoke at meetings for the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, the American Association of Colleges and Universities, the National Academic Advising Association, the Higher Learning Commission and numerous regional and state meetings. She also served on the National Science Foundation's selection committee for the prestigious NOYCE grants.



She has long been recognized for her role in collaboration across colleges, departments and other universities.

Rodgers was a founding member of USI's Council of Chairs and Program Directors and served as

Maria A. Anderson '16 graduates today with a Bachelor of Science in Biology with a 3.9 GPA.

During the Pott College of Science, Engineering, and Education and Outreach and Engagement Commencement ceremony, Anderson will receive the President's Medal, the highest honor presented to a graduate in the Class of 2016.

Anderson is described by one of her professors as, "insightful, positive and always giving her all," and by another as, "driven by curiosity and a love for learning and understanding systems that are complex." These comments reflect well her efforts to both further her education and to become a better physician.

Throughout her time at USI, Anderson has displayed dedication and professionalism in her pursuit to learn, specifically in her participation in the Early Undergraduate Research Program, where her efforts provided an opportunity to present her data at the Indiana Branch of the American Society for Microbiology meeting, where she received a USI Endeavor Grant.

Observed as someone who works hard to help other students in their coursework, Anderson displays a genuine concern about the people around her. This is representative of her desire to be a physician who will work with patients and their families to create a balance of health and wellness.

Also, while at USI, she has been an active member of the Gamma Phi Beta sorority, where she served as financial vice president; the National Society of Collegiate Scholars; the USI Strategic Planning Committee; and as an AMIGO (student orientation leader). She also is a member of the Student Ambassador Organization, where she has served as president, and currently is serving on the Pott College Student Advisory Board as the biology representative.

Anderson is a member of the Honors Program and has been recognized with many accolades while at USI, including a Presidential Scholarship, Distinguished Sophomore Award, Fraternity and Sorority Life New Member of the Year, Fraternity and Sorority Life Officer of the Year, oral and poster presenter at the Indiana Branch of the American Society of Microbiology, Homecoming Court Representative, and Early Undergraduate Research participant.

She volunteers her time as a leader with USI's Camp Eagle, as a Student Ambassador and as a

YMCA Group Exercise Instructor. She also is a member of the Pre-Professional Health Club, and is a student worker in Undergraduate Admissions.

Anderson is the daughter of Ralph and Angie Anderson of Evansville. She has one sibling, Phillip, a graduate of the USI Nursing Program, who currently is working toward his Nurse Practitioner degree at USI. After graduation, Anderson plans to complete a Master of Health Administration degree at USI, while attending Indiana University School of Medicine.



opened including student apartments, residence halls, a fitness, wellness and recreation center, an Education Center and Torrington Science Center wing and Rice Library.

From 1994 to 2009, President H. Ray Hoops led institutional growth with new construction, continued academic program development and an ever-increasing, diverse student population coming from counties throughout Indiana, the

President Linda L. M. Bennett became the third president of the University of Southern Indiana in 2009. In her inaugural address, she referenced the University's founding in 1965 and said, "Service to a greater good was a primary reason the University of Southern Indiana was created. It is our touchstone, and years after our founding and emergence as a separate state University, there is little doubt that USI is delivering on the promise of its founding."

USI began as a regional campus administered by Indiana State University. During the initial 20 years, the institution experienced enrollment growth and developed under an administration led by President David L. Rice with faculty dedicated to teaching and serving the community. Dr. Rice's vision of public higher education led to the modern, thriving institution we know today.

The institution started with 412 students and increased steadily to 2,420 students by 1985. In the next two decades, growth continued as the institution's name changed to the University of Southern Indiana, and the student population grew to more than 10,000 students by 2004. More buildings
